





The boy in question lies in a coma in hospital and the detectives discover he is the son of a local Mafia boss. They also discover that his elder brother was killed in Italy a year earlier under unusual circumstances. Who would want to kill young boys and what could be their motive? The police officers work diligently to solve the crime, but at the same time they do not ignore their home life. McBriar, whose girl friend left him six months earlier, strikes up a new relationship with Karen, a single mother living alone with her young son. The characterization within the novel is excellent, including the autistic witness, Gary. Mauro Azzano cleverly manages to intertwine the love interest of McBriar with his gradual peeling of the mystery, layer by layer. I found the book a thoroughly good read. For those who love detective novels in the vein of P.D. James, or J.D. Robb, this is the page-turner for them."
